MAYORAL VACANCY

The City of Cedar Hills announces a vacancy in the office of Mayor created by the resignation of Mayor Brad Sears, which was effective June 1, 2004. Pursuant to Utah Code 20A-1-510, notice is given that the City Council will fill said vacancy at a Special Council Meeting to be held on Tuesday, June 29, 2004 at 7:00 p.m. at the Public Safety Building. Any qualified person interested in being considered for appointment to the position of Mayor may make application to Kim E. Holindrake, City Recorder, at the City Office. Applications will be accepted until June 23, 2004.

CITY MANAGER REPORT

- ✓ Trail Ribbon-Cutting: Cedar Hills' proudly unveiled the latest addition to its trails system. Approximately 45 people attended the brief ribbon-cutting ceremony for the Bonneville Shoreline Trail and Forest Creek Trail, which concluded with a golf cart tour of the newly completed trails. There was some cold weather and rain to contend with, but it did not dim the excitement for this beautiful addition to the City's overall parks and trails plan!
- ✓ Resignation of Mayor Brad Sears: We are sad to see Mayor Sears leave the remainder of his term, but are excited for him to be able to spend more time with his family. Sears has spent a great deal of time serving the community through terms on the Board of Adjustment (Mar 1986 - Apr 1988), Council (Mar 1996 - Nov 1998) and most recently as the Mayor (Nov 1998 - June 1, 2004). When Mayor Sears began his service on the Council, Cedar Hills consisted of 350 households; as of June 2004, Cedar Hills now has 1,467 households with a population exceeding 6,500. Many changes and improvements have come to Cedar Hills over these years and we thank Mayor Sears for his part in those accomplishments.
- ✓ Family Festival Parade: The City is actively seeking suggestions for the Grand Marshal of the 2004 parade. If anyone has a suggestion and contact information for an appropriate person, please contact Jenny at 785-9668.
- ✓ SIGNS: Please be reminded that signs are not allowed in any City right-of-way or on City sign posts. MEETING UPDATES - MAY

May 4, 2004 - City Council Meeting

- Deerfield Elementary requested to change the installation location for their school marquee. The school requested to mount the marquee on the school building instead of on free-standing pillars. The City Council approved this change with the provision that the illumination be turned off by 10:00 p.m. each night.
- Resolution 5-4-2004A was approved that adopted a 3.33% Municipal Telecommunications License Tax. This license tax will replace any prior telecommunications franchise fee or \$1/cellular phone fee that cities have collected.

May 18, 2004 - City Council Meeting

- \$3,500 for the purchase of a swing set for the Sunset Park was approved.
- The following appointments were made for the Cedar Hills Youth City Council: Rachele Clingo, as Cedar Hills Youth Mayor, Luke Martin as Youth Mayor Pro-Tempore; Youth City Council to the following people: Rhett Hildebrandt, Cameron Christensen, Jared Holindrake, Chris Sessions and Pace Killian. Grady Killian was recognized as the Youth Publicity Chairperson as well as Nicole Brimely as the Youth City Council Historian. Any remaining positions will be filled by the Youth City Council Advisor.

May 27, 2004 - Planning Commission Meeting

- The Planning Commission reviewed the final plat for Canyon Heights, Plat G. The Commission recommended denial of the project as proposed due to concerns with safety and ordinance compliance.
- Review of the Commercial Design Guidelines continued. The Planning Commission has been reviewing this document and will be proposing recommendations to the City Council for modification.

CEDAR HILLS GOLF CLUB NEWS

"Your Turn for Success" Golf School is in full swing! The golf schools are taught by John Geertsen, Jr., PGA Professional and Director of Instruction at Cedar Hills Golf Club and Gina Higbee, LPGA Professional and Director of Golf at Cedar Hills Golf Club. John and Gina have many years of experience teaching juniors and adults of all skill levels. Geertsen and Higbee are also the instructors for all the Junior Only Golf Clinics.

- **Junior Summer Golf Camps:** Each camp has a limit of six students per instructor and is structured to give your junior maximum exposure to the instructor. A minimum of three students per camp is required. Camps include: Four days of learning golf skills, safety and etiquette; two hours per day of instruction from an experienced golf professional; time on the driving range and putting green and golf course time on the last day; short video of his/her golf swing with instruction; and a "Your Turn for Success" graduate tee-shirt. The cost is \$139 each camp with a discount if multiple camps are attended. Camps are open to all levels of junior golfers—girls and boys 7-17 years old. Camps start June 8 and run through mid-August with a Junior Summer Championship Golf Tournament to end the summer!
- **Women's Golf Clinics:** The Women's Golf School will be limited to six students per instruction to give maximum exposure to the instructor. A minimum of three students per school required. Classes include: Two days of learning the basic skills of golf; four hours of total instruction; "Your Turn for Success" authored by John Geertsen, Jr., PGA Teaching Professional; Mike Reid, PGA Tour Professional; and Garth Fisher, PhD at B.Y.U. Each student will also receive a short video of her golf swing with instruction. The cost is \$150 for each student with a discount if multiple schools are attended.
- **Juniors Only Golf Clinic:** Level I - Junior Golfers (ages 7-13) clinic held every Saturday from 8:00 - 9:00 a.m.; Level II - Junior Golfers (ages 14-17) clinic held every Saturday from 9:30 - 10:30 a.m. Each clinic is \$20 per student with a maximum of 12 students per class. Clinics are already underway.

DID YOU KNOW—TAKE THE CHALLENGE GETTING TO KNOW THE LONE PEAK FIRE/EMS

The Lone Peak Public Safety District (LPPSD) currently operates under the leadership of Craig Carlisle, Fire Chief, with Brad Freeman as the Assistant Fire Chief. There are an additional 35 part-time and volunteer employees that are trained to use skills in firefighting, rescue, and emergency medical treatment. There are approximately ten part-time firefighters and ten part-time paramedics that work 12-16 hour day and night shifts in addition to working full-time for other agencies throughout Utah and Salt Lake Counties.

The fire district covers a large area encompassing Cedar Hills, Alpine, Highland and American Fork Canyon. At this time, the main station is in Alpine, with operating stations in both Cedar Hills and Highland. The Alpine fire station houses a wide variety of apparatus and equipment including a 75' aerial ladder truck, a front-line paramedic ambulance and a smaller four-wheel drive ambulance. You will also find two well-equipped brush trucks, a 4,000 gallon water tender, and an all purpose rescue vehicle that has all of the equipment needed to do vehicle extrication and rope or water rescue. Both Cedar Hills and Highland are privileged to have an ambulance, brush truck and fire engine stationed in each city.

At last check, the LPPSD is the only emergency service agency in northern Utah County to offer a full-time 24-hour-a-day Paramedic service. This is a status that the citizens of Cedar Hills, Alpine and Highland can be proud of. In fact, the only other agencies in Utah County to offer this level of service to their citizens are Provo and Orem cities. The Lone Peak PSD responded to over 800 emergency calls last year alone. About two-thirds of these calls are medical and the other one-third are fire related or a combination of the two. Having a Paramedic service along with well-trained firefighters offers peace of mind knowing that you will be taken care of in your time of need with the most qualified and highest-trained people in the industry.

All of the LPPSD part-time firefighters and most of the volunteers have been certified by the State to at least a Firefighter II Level, which is the best training a firefighter can have, short of "good ole" experience. Most of these firefighters have also earned certifications in Hazardous Materials Operations, Wildland Firefighting, and Technical Rescue.

In short, what all of this means to you is that no matter whether the situation is big or small, the LPPSD is ready, willing and able to assist you. We have the specialized equipment to match our specialized training to make sure that your "less than perfect" situation is made better. If you are in an emergency situation, rest assured that you will have the best at your side in just 3-5 minutes from the time you call 9-1-1. Thank you for allowing us to serve you.

IDENTITY THEFT—DON'T BE A VICTIM!

Identity Theft is what many are calling America's fastest growing type of robbery. However, crooks are working without the usual tools of the trade. Forget sawed-offs and ski masks; your social security number will do the trick or that blank, pre-approved credit application you tossed out with today's trash. Millions of dollars were lost in the past year by financial institutions across the country. The perpetrator may use a variety of tactics to drain your finances: posing as a loan officer and ordering your credit report (which lists account numbers); "shoulder surfing" at the ATM to get your PIN number; "dumpster diving" in trash bins for unshredded credit applications, cancelled checks or bank records; or, until recently, notifying the Postal Service to redirect your mail to the address of choice, such as a mail drop, which allows anonymity. Here are a few **precautions** that can make repairing the damage a lot easier:

- ✓ *Photocopy both sides of everything in your wallet. Keep the copies in a safe place. If your wallet is ever stolen or lost, you can easily locate the company telephone numbers you will need to call to report the loss.
- ✓ *File a police report where the wallet was stolen or lost!
- ✓ *Notify your bank, the three credit reporting agencies listed below, and the Social Security Administration fraud line to put a fraud alert on your accounts and credit reports. This lets them know that your information has been stolen and they will notify you if anyone attempts to obtain credit in your name. (Equifax: 1-800-525-6285; Experian: 1-888-397-3742; TransUnion: 1-800-680-7289; Social Security Administration Fraud line: 1-800-269-0271)
- ✓ Shred pre-approved credit applications, credit card receipts, bills and other financial information and all mail or documents that contain your personal identifying information before tossing them in the trash.
- ✓ Never give out personal information over the phone such as your date of birth, mother's maiden name, credit card number, social security number, or bank PIN code, except to an established firm or someone you know.
