Draft Environmental Assessment Public Meeting

The United States Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS), with assistance of Pleasant Grove City as the project sponsor, announces the availability of a draft Environmental Assessment (EA) describing the proposed improvements within the American Fork-Dry Creek Watershed.

The proposed improvements consist of piping approximately 6,000 feet of the Mill Ditch in Cedar Hills near the mouth of American Fork Canyon and replacement of the American Fork diversion structure.

You are invited to attend a Draft Environmental Assessment public meeting, which will describe the alternatives analyzed and potential impacts to the environment from the project. This meeting will take place **Tuesday, June 11** from 7:00 pm to 8:00 pm in the Vista Room located at 10640 N Clubhouse Drive, Cedar Hills. STORM WATER TIPS OF THE MONTH

We Can Make a Difference!

Storm drains lead to rivers, lakes, and streams. When contaminants enter storm drains, they pollute our water resources. Storm water runoff can pick up contaminants, including sediment, oil, gas, fertilizer, pet waste, grass clippings, car wash water, etc. By making some simple changes, you can help prevent polluted runoff:

- Fix auto leaks promptly
- Properly dispose of used motor oil
- Don't fertilize before it rains
- Don't top off when you fill up
- Put trash in its place
- Never dump anything down a storm drain!

Street Projects

During the summer months, various street projects are scheduled throughout the city. Please be patient and courteous as the construction is in progress. These city projects are in addition to the current Utah County Canyon Road asphalt replacement project.

Parking for Boats and Trailers

A friendly reminder not to use public streets for long-term parking of cars, trucks, trailers (for work or play), RV's, boats, campers, basketball standards, etc. According to city ordinances, such items cannot remain on the street for more than 48 hours. Keep all of the above-mentioned items on hard surfaces on your property.

Installing a Fence, Shed, or Retaining Wall?

Prior to installation, please visit the city's website or call the city office for important information. The website provides a download and instructions for submitting the required installation permit. Call Blue Stakes before you dig; it's the law! Dial 811 to reach Blue Stakes.

Street Light Out or Flickering?

Please let the city's public works department know if you are aware of any street lights that need to be serviced.

Landscape Watering Restrictions Continue



The city continues with outdoor watering conservation measures for all residential water users. Residents with odd-ending house numbers will water **Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays**. Residents with even-ending house numbers will water **Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays**. Spot watering with a hose is allowed on Sundays for everyone. Restrictions are enforced with a warning for the first violation, a \$50 fine for the second violation, and a \$200 fine for the third and subsequent violations. The policy is in effect from April 15 to October 15. Commercial, church, park, and golf properties may be on different schedules, including daytime watering, to offset water demand.

As we begin another watering season, we encourage everyone to implement water conservation practices. Visit conservewater.utah.gov for more information. Water is not a renewable resource, so we need to use it wisely!

Door-to-Door Solicitors

Help keep our neighborhoods safe. Ask solicitors to show a city-issued photo badge or instruct them to obtain a license from the city. Report violations or nuisances to police dispatch 24/7 at 801-794-3970.

Holiday Office Closing & Delay in Service

The city office will close July 4 and July 24. Friday's garbage and recycling services will be delayed until Saturday the week of July 4. Services will run as usual with no delays the week of July 24.

Yards of the Month to Begin Again

Each month during the summer, the Beautification Committee awards residents in recognition of their efforts to beautify the city. Photos of the 2018 Yards of the Month winners are available for viewing on the city's website under Residents>News and Events. One winner is selected from each of the five voting precincts between June and September.

Using City Parks

Many people have begun using the city's beautiful parks and trails. Please be aware that there are rules established for usage to ensure safety and enjoyment for everyone, including those who live near the parks.


- Park curfew is 11:00 p.m. to 5 a.m. Persons in the park after hours may be subject to legal action.
- Amplified sound has restrictions. Refer to city code 6-8-6 for more information.
- Pets are to be on a leash, and owners should dispose of pet waste properly.
- Children should be supervised at all times.
- Respect the privacy of the landowners who are adjacent to the parks and trails.
- Vehicles are not allowed in the parks or on the trails.
- Smoking, including e-cigarettes, and alcoholic beverages are prohibited.
- Please do not disturb the landscaping.

If we all follow the rules of civility, our parks and trails will continue to be an appealing and enjoyable part of Cedar Hills. If you witness damage, vandalism, or suspicious activity, please call 911 or notify non-emergency police dispatch 24/7 at: 801-794-3970.

Fireworks & Fire Restrictions

With the fireworks season upon us, the city declares its support for the Lone Peak Fire Department to limit fire risk in our community by adopting a resolution (City Code 5-2-3A4), which outlines these restrictions:

- **Fireworks:** All aerial and nonstationary fireworks, i.e. ground flower types, are prohibited inside and within 200 feet of the highlighted areas of the restrictions map and within 200 feet of any undeveloped lot. The map can be viewed at cedarhills.org/fires2019. Additionally, **ALL** fireworks and aerials are prohibited in city parks, the golf course, and all other city-owned properties.



- **Open Fires:** All open fires east of Canyon Road within city limits are prohibited, unless a screen is used. Cedar Hills officials and staff wish all residents a fun and safe summer. Please use caution and good judgement when using fireworks or building open fires.

2019 Municipal Election

A municipal election will be held this year for three city council positions, all four-year terms. The candidate filing period is between **Monday, June 3** and **Friday, June 7**. Interested persons may file for office with the City Recorder at the Cedar Hills city office, 10246 N Canyon Road, during the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. A \$35 filing fee is required.



Vote-by-Mail Election Information

The 2019 Elections will be conducted using vote-by-mail. Registered voters are not required to fill out an application for the vote-by-mail ballot. Each registered voter will be mailed a ballot with instructions for returning the ballot.

Please be sure you are registered to vote. If you have changed your name or address, even within the city, it is necessary to re-register in order to receive your vote-by-mail-ballot.

Talk Shop with a Cop

The American Fork Police Department has implemented a new program called Communities that Care to better serve the citizens of American Fork and Cedar Hills. Communities that Care is an evidence-based prevention program that is specifically tailored to each community.

Scientific trials have shown CTC communities are 25% to 33% less likely to have health and behavioral problems. The program is currently funded by a grant from the Health Department at no cost to the city. It has also proven to be very cost effective, returning \$5.30 in community benefits for every \$1.00 spent.

This program will be a great resource for the department and community in our efforts to improve the quality of life and safety of our residents, especially our youth and area businesses. If you have questions about CTC, please email policetalkshop@afcity.net.


Summer Bowling League
